




Studies show that reading for pleasure makes a big difference to children's educational performance.

Evidence suggests that children who read for enjoyment every day not only perform better in reading tests than those who don't, but also develop a broader vocabulary, increased general knowledge and a better understanding of other cultures.


In fact, reading for pleasure is more likely to determine whether a child does well at school than their social or economic background.



Sharing a book with your child allows you to share adventures and experiences in the safe world of the book. It allows you to ask questions, talk about what has happened and decide what you think together Sharing a book can be a bonding experience and for young children, cuddling up with a parent to read a book can be a special time. Reading is important, but don't feel that you have to take the role of your child's teacher or put pressure on your child to start to read before they go to school. It's great to instil a love of books and language from an early age, but most of all, be led by your child and their interests and pace of development.

# Internet Safety Tips

We all spend too much time online, especially children, it is important to be vigilant about what your child is doing online - talk to them frequently and be present when they are using technology. Too many children are accessing games, videos and apps that are inappropriate. Here a few tips to think about to help keep your child safe online:

- Children should expect to have devices checked regularly to ensure they are safe and free from harm. Encourage your children to share what they do with you what they use, who they talk to and what they post.
- What we see online often isn't always the reality. Talk to your children about asking questions, not always believing what they see, hear and read and that they should check with an adult if they are not sure.

In school we have filtering and monitoring systems that help to keep children safe (as well as visually monitoring them when using technology in the classroom). Please make sure they are safe on devices they use at home too.



# <u> Graiseley Hub Car Park - Reminder!</u>

When dropping off and collecting children from school please take care when walking through the car parks. Children should be supervised at all times. Cars drive on and off the car park throughout the day and the entrance is narrow, staff at the Graiseley Hub have reported that some children are not moving safely through the car park and are not being supervised closely enough.
